## COLLEGE PROFILE

Erstwhile '**Pandit Anant Ram Sanatan Dharam College**' was a privately managed college which was established in July 1995 by a well-known philanthropist Sh. Bali Ram Sharma, in the memory of his father late Sh. Anant Ram Sharma, a resident of nearly Busal village, with the prime objective of providing higher education to the youths of this rural area at their doorsteps. In the beginning years, the college started functioning with enrolment in Arts stream. The commerce subject was introduced in the year 1996. With the serious efforts of the college administration, classes in science subject i.e. non-medical were added in the year 2000. Subsequently in the year 2014 the Government of Himachal Pradesh took over '**Pandit Anant Ram Sanatan Dharam College Baroh**' vide its notification No. EDN/A/kha (1)/15/2014, dated 7<sup>th</sup> February 2014 and it was renamed as '**Government Degree College Baroh**'.

Situated on the holy land of '**Baba Kalinath**', Government Degree college Baroh is a co-educational institute located near the most famous '**Radha Krishna**' temple which is also known as '**Baba Baroh**' temple in Gram Panchayat Danoa, Tehsil Baroh district Kangra of Himachal Pradesh. It is only at a distance of 28 km from Kangra city with its latitude and longitude at 31.69 N and 76.90 W respectively.

At present, Government Degree College Baroh is imparting education in Humanities, Science and Commerce at the undergraduate level. Moreover, all the faculty members are more proficient and attend refresher courses, orientation courses and short-term trainings at regular intervals. The college caters the need of the rural students especially girls who accounts for more than 70 percent of the total strength of the college. The principal and faculty always encourage the students to vibrantly participate in various activities ranging from environment conservation to cultural participations and social to moral under the aegis of Eco Club, National Service Scheme, Rovers and Rangers and Road Safety Club and Red Ribbon Club etc. The Career Counselling and Placement Cell (CC&PC) provides platform to the students to get know about the career opportunities during and after their graduation. Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has been established in the college for the promotion of the quality of education and infrastructure as per the requirement of UGC and NAAC. ## ADMISSION UNDER UGC CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM (CBCS)

The Govt. of Himachal Pradesh has introduced Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) under the Rashtriya Uchchar Shiksha Abhiyan (RUSA) from the academic session 2013-14 and these regulations have been called the HPU Regulations for CBCS and Continuous Assessment Grading Pattern (CAGP) for UG Programmes. However, after adopting the UGC CBCS pattern by H.P. University from the academic session 2018-19, the university clarified that eligibility conditions regarding the age limit, pass percentage or minimum eligibility etc. at the entry level to B.A./B. Com/B.Sc.-1<sup>st</sup> year remains the same as mentioned in the original HP University ordinance.

## GENERAL RULES FOR ADMISSION TO UNDERGRADUATE CLASSES

All the students who have been promoted in B.A./B.Com./B.Sc. 1<sup>st</sup> Year and B.A /B.Com. /B.Sc. 2<sup>nd</sup> Year should get admission in the next class on Roll-on-Basis which will be purely provisional. This provisional admission will be regularized on the declaration of result. Admission on Roll-on-Basis will also be as per notified schedule of H.P. University Shimla/SPU Mandi. Fee/Funds once deposited will not be refunded.

### A. General Rules for Online Admission: -

1. Admission will be strictly on fulfilment of eligibility conditions.
2. Any gap in the academic career of an applicant must be supported by documentary evidence. (Attach self-attested affidavit)



3. Applicants who have passed Prabhakar are not eligible for admission.
4. Failed candidates from other colleges will not be admitted.
5. **Application forms must be completed in all respects along with the following documents:**
  - a) Original Character Certificate from the institution last attended.
  - b) Attested copies of detailed marks card of the previous examination passed.
  - c) Attested copy of Matriculation Certificate for the proof of date of birth. (Applicants must also bring the original marks sheets)
  - d) Three passport size photographs of the candidate (one pasted on bio-data card. One on the admission form and one for the Identity Card).
  - e) A passport size photograph of the parent/guardian to be affixed on PTA membership form. (Guardian means only blood relation but not a student of this college).
  - f) Attested copy of Aadhar Card & IRDP certificate are required.
  - g) Attested copy of H.P. Bonafide certificate to avail fee concession for girl students only.
  - h) A photocopy of APAAR/ABC ID.
  - i) Anti-Ragging affidavit (a copy of pledge taken through online mode on anti-ragging website).
6. The students must produce original certificates at the time of admission.
7. Candidates seeking admission from Boards/Universities other than H.P. Board of School Education/ Himachal Pradesh University must produce migration certificate in original. Those who have passed first year/second year of a degree course from other university will have to produce Equivalence certificate from Himachal Pradesh University.
8. Admission rules are subject to change as per HPU notifications from time to time.
9. Admission of a student is liable to be cancelled if he/she furnishes incomplete, wrong/false information or if facts are concealed. Disciplinary action will also be taken against such a candidate.
10. Not with standing eligibility for admission, the principal can refuse admission if the conduct of a student has not been up to the mark during the previous year.
11. Initially, all admissions will be provisional subject to approval by H.P. University/SP University.
12. A student can migrate from one college to another in accordance with the rules laid down by H.P. University. However, each student must obtain the approval of the concerned Admission Committee.
13. Students seeking exemption from tuition fee for disability must attach an attested copy of disability certificate.
14. The Principal reserves the right to disallow or cancel any admission.

## **B. OTHER RULES FOR ADMISSION TO UNDERGRADUATE CLASSES**

A student who has passed 10+2 examination or an equivalent course can get admission in the first year of three-year degree course if he/she fulfils the eligibility conditions given below: -



1. An applicant must not be more than 23 years (25 years for girls) of age as on 1.7.2025 i.e. he/she should not have been born earlier than 1.7.2002 (1.7.2000 for girls). However, in case of over age candidates, the Vice-Chancellor of affiliating university may allow age relaxation up to six months. In case of Scheduled Caste/Scheduled Tribes students' a relaxation in age up to three years is allowed as per rules.
2.
  - a. Minimum pass percentage for admission in different faculties is given below. Change in percentage will subject to any order of H.P. University.

Bachelor of Arts	:	33%
Bachelor of Commerce (Boys)	:	45% (40% for those boys who have passed +2 with Commerce).
Bachelor of Science	:	45% (+2 non-medical)

However, for girl candidates, the minimum Pass percentage is 33% in Bachelor of Arts and Bachelor of Commerce.
  - b. Relaxation of 5 marks for SC/ST students will be given for admission to Commerce and Science faculty.
  - c. A student seeking admission of B.A. 1<sup>st</sup> year with Mathematics as one of the subjects of study should have either 45 marks in aggregate or 45 marks in Maths at +2 level.
3.
  - a. A candidate having passed 10+2 examination in four subjects (including English) from any University/Board recognized by law can seek admission.
  - b. Admission is open to anybody who has passed intermediate or an equivalent examination in four subjects from any recognized Indian University or Board (Five in case of National Open Schools). Only passed candidates of NOS will be admitted if otherwise eligible.
  - c. Admission is also open to a candidate who has passed an equivalent examination from any foreign University, Board, college or School which is recognized by Association of Indian Universities. Vice-chancellor or by the committee authorized to determine equivalence.
  - d. Students coming from vocational stream will be given admission to B.A. 1<sup>st</sup> Year/B.Com. 1<sup>st</sup> Year having Maths/Economics as one of the compulsory subjects at +2 level with the requisite minimum pass percentage as prescribed for admission to B.A. I/ B. Com I. (Pass Course)
4. A student seeking admission to B.Com. must have studied Commerce/Mathematics or Economic, as compulsory subject at 10+2 level.
5. If a candidate has passed +2 or an equivalent examination from a University/Board where results are shown in terms of grades or standards, eligibility will be determined after the conversion of grades or standards as per the given formula.
6. If the candidate has compartment in 10+2 or an equivalent examination, he/she will not be admitted.

### **RULES OF REFUSAL OF ADMISSION**

- i. Applicants who have passed intermediate from Hindi Sahitya Samelan, Allahabad or Prabhakar are not eligible for admission in the first year for three-year degree course.



- ii. Any candidate who passed his/her 10+2 examination after the month of July (i.e.; in case of compartment in any subject) will only be eligible to take admission as per the notification of affiliating university and Directorate of Higher Education H.P.
- iii. Any candidate who appeared in or passed his/her 10+2 examination without English as a subject shall not be eligible for admission in first year for three-year degree course.
- iv. In spite of the eligibility for admission, the Principal can refuse admission if the conduct of the student has not been up to the mark during the previous years.
- v. The Principal reserves the right to disallow or cancel any admission without assigning any reason.

## **CHANGE OF SUBJECT & RULES FOR MIGRATION**

### **Change of Subject:**

The change in one subject (DSC subject only) is permissible in the first year only that too within fifteen days of admission. Student may submit an application for change of subject to the Principal. The change of DSC subject will be allowed only out of available subject combinations.

### **Rules for Migration:**

- i. The migration of students migrating during the same course/session from any affiliated college or institution (including ICDEOL) to another affiliated college or institution shall be governed by the regulations framed by the Executive Council of the concerned affiliating university from time to time.
- ii. The students who migrate from this college to another college or vice-versa must ensure that college name is changed on university online Roll with intimation to the Exam Co-ordinator and concerned clerk.
- iii. Further, the whole of the migration process will be online on RME Portal of HP university. The student wants to migrate must have to confirm first the seat available in the concerned subject in the college where he/she is going to migrate. Only then the online migration process will be initiated subject to the approval by the concerned college in which the student is migrating.

## **UGC CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM (CBCS)**

### **Regulations for Under Graduate Programmes (B.A./B.Sc./B.Com.)**

The UGC Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) is an academic framework introduced by the University Grants Commission (UGC) in India to provide greater flexibility and academic mobility to students in higher education. Under CBCS, students can choose from a wide range of core, elective, and skill-based courses across different disciplines. Each course is assigned a certain number of credits, and students must earn the required number of credits to complete their program. The system promotes a student-centric approach, allowing personalised learning pathways and encouraging interdisciplinary education.



## The outlines of UGC Choice Based Credit System

### Types of Courses:

1. **Core Courses (Compulsory subjects):** A course which should compulsorily be studied by a candidate as a core requirement is termed as core course.
2. **Elective Courses (Discipline-specific & Interdisciplinary):** Generally, a course which may be very specific or specialised or advanced or supportive to the discipline/subject of study or which provides an extended scope or which enables an exposure to some other discipline/subject/domain or nurtures the candidates' proficiency/skill is called an Elective Course.
  - **Discipline Specific Elective (DSE) Course:** An elective course offered under the main discipline/subject of study is referred to as Discipline Specific Elective.
  - **Generic Elective (GE) Course (Only B.A./B.Com. Classes):** Generic Elective Courses are interdisciplinary courses offered under the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) that allow students to explore subjects outside their core discipline. These courses are designed to broaden a student's academic perspective and enhance their overall knowledge and skill set.
3. **Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC):** The Ability Enhancement (AE) courses are of two kinds: Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC) and Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC).
  - **Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC):** Environmental Science, English Communication/ MIL (Modern Indian Language)-Hindi/Sanskrit.
  - **Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC):** Skill enhancement courses are a component of the CBCS designed to equip students with a focus on practical skills and knowledge such as communication, IT, data analysis, entrepreneurship, or language proficiency that enhance their employability and professional abilities.

### Course Evaluation Criteria

- All courses involve an evaluation system of students that has the following two components:
  - i. **Continuous Comprehensive Evaluation (CCE):** accounting for 30% of the final grade that student get in a course.
  - ii. **End-Term Examination (ETE):** accounting for the remaining 70% of the final grade that a student gets in a course.

**Continuous Comprehensive Evaluation (CCE):** This would have three components:

- a) Classroom Attendance Incentive: - Each student will have to attend minimum of 75% lecture/practicles. A student having less than 75% attendance will not be allowed to appear in End Term Examination.
- b) Provided that those having 74% and 65% attendance will apply for exemption in the prescribed form accompanied by clear reasons for absence.
- c) Provided that exemption from 75% attendance will be given to those participating in prescribed cocurricular activities (e.g. N.C.C., N.S.S., Youth Festivals, Sports etc.) To the extent of 25%.

Those having greater than 75% attendance will be awarded CCE marks as follows: -





≥ 75% but < 80%	-	1 mark
≥ 80% but < 85%	-	2 marks
≥ 85% but < 90%	-	3 marks
≥ 90% but < 95%	-	4 marks
≥ 95% and above	-	5 marks

- One class test of 5 marks for each paper will be conducted after completion of 40 % syllabus.
- There will be one House Test of 10 marks of each paper after 48 teaching days after completion of 70 % syllabus.
- The remaining 10 marks of the CCA will be awarded on the basis of Seminar/Assignment/Tutorials.

#### End-Term Examination (ETE):

- The remaining 70% of the final grade of the student in a course will be on the basis of an End-Term Examination (ETE) that will be of three hours duration and will be covering the whole syllabus of the course.

**Note:** - A student will have to pass both components (i.e. CCA & ETE) separately to become eligible to be declared successful in a course.

#### Division of Marks:

For Practical Subjects = 50 Marks Theory + 20 Mark Practical + 30 Marks CCA = 100 Marks.

For Non-Practical Subjects = 70 Marks Theory + 30 Marks CCA = 100 Marks.

#### Letter Grade and Grade Point Average (GPA):

Undergraduate programs of the college affiliated to Himachal Pradesh University, adheres to the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) for grading. This system employs a 10-point scale, utilising both absolute and relative grading methods, depending on the course and the number of enrolled students.

For courses with 50 or fewer students, absolute grading is applied as follows:

**GPA and CGPA Calculation:**

The Grade Point Average (GPA) or Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) are calculated using the formula:

$$GPA \text{ or } CGPA = (\sum C_i \times G_i) / \sum C_i$$

Where:

- $C_i$  = Credit for course  $i$
- $G_i$  = Grade point for course  $i$
- $N$  = Number of courses

At the end of the undergraduate program, the CGPA is determined separately for:

1. Part I – Compulsory Courses
2. Part II – General Interest and Hobby Courses
3. Part III – Core and Elective Courses

For the final degree classification, only the CGPA from Part III is considered.

To qualify for the undergraduate degree, students must achieve a minimum CGPA of 4.51 in both Part I and Part II. The final transcript will indicate the completion of these parts.

**Passing Criteria:**

The students must secure:

- At least 40% in each component: Theory (End-Term-Examination), Internal Assessment (Continuous Comprehensive Assessment), and Practical (if applicable).
- A minimum of 45% in aggregate to pass a subject.

These standards ensure a comprehensive evaluation of a student’s performance throughout the course.



## THE ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA FOR ADMISSION

- A pass in the Senior Secondary (10+2) examination (Academic Stream) conducted by the H.P. Board of School Education or an examination accepted as equivalent there to by the various bodies of the H.P. University.
- Provided that the candidates who have passed the qualifying examination with arts/humanities stream shall be given preferences in admission to B.A. Programme.
- Provided that the candidates who have passed the qualifying examination with science stream shall be given preference in admission to B.Sc. programme.
- Provided that the candidates who have passed the qualifying examination with commerce stream shall be given preference in admission to B. Com. programme.
- Provided that the candidates who have passed the qualifying examination with Mathematics as one of the subjects shall be given preference in admission to B.Com. programme.
- Provided that the candidates who have passed the qualifying examination with Economics as one of the subjects shall be given preference in admission to B.A./B.Com. programme.

#### Fines

- Every student must pay his/her dues on the dates notified by the college from time to time.
  - A student will have to pay dues once for whole of the academic year i.e.; for one year, through online mode at the time of admission.
  - Failure to pay dues on due date will entail fine of Re. 1/- per day.
  - In case of non-payment of dues on time, the name of the student will be struck off from the college roll.
  - University Registration Fee will not be charged from the students migrating from another college if he/she is already registered with the affiliating university. Other dues will have to be paid from the month of joining the institution, provided that he/she has already paid the dues in the college from which he/she has migrated.

**Note: The University Registration Fee, Annual Examination Fee and the Migration Fee (if applicable) will be paid the student online directly to university.**

- The name of the student will be struck off from the college roll if he/she remains absent without leave for 7 days (including holidays) in any class/subject (theory/practical).
- In case, if the name of any student is struck off from the college roll, then the re-admission will be allowed with a fine of Rs. 100/- only as a re-admission fee, if the student applies for re-admission through online portal within 15 days from the date his/her name is struck off.
- If a student fails to seek re-admission within first 15 days, then he/she can apply for re-admission upto 30 days from the date his/her name was struck off from the college roll with a fine of Rs. 200/- as re-admission fee with the personal presence of his/her



parents/guardian. No re-admission will be allowed after 30 days from the date the name of the student is struck off from the college roll.

5. The re-admission will be done after citing the valid reasons for longer absence accompanying the valid documentary evidence.
6. Every student will have to produce no dues certificate from the fee clerk if he/she wants to leave the college.
7. The security deposit (in case of library security) will deem to be lapsed if a student does not apply for refund of security within one year of leaving the college.
8. The fine imposed for absence has to be paid as per dates notified by the college before commencing the End-Term Examinations. Those students who will not pay the absence fine will not be allowed to sit in their End-Term Examinations.

### **FEE REFUND POLICY OF THE COLLEGE**

The fee refund policy of the college strictly adheres to the guidelines set by the University Grants Commission (UGC) and the affiliating university. The college's fee refund policy is structured based on the timing of admission cancellation:

- **100% Refund:** If admission is cancelled 15 days more or before the officially notified last date.
- **90% Refund:** If admission is cancelled less than 15 days before the last date.
- **80% Refund:** If admission is cancelled within 15 days after the last date.
- **50% Refund:** If admission is cancelled between 15-30 days after the last date.
- **No Refund:** If admission is cancelled more than 30 days after the last date.

**Note:** A processing fee, not exceeding 10% of the total fees, may be deducted. Refunds are typically processed within 15 days of receiving a written application.

## **PRIZES AND AWARDS, CLASS TESTS, HOUSE TESTS AND END TERM EXAMINATIONS**

**Prizes and Awards:** The college recognises and celebrates the achievements of its students through various prizes and awards distributed annually in its Annual Prize Distribution Function. These honours are given for excellence in academics, sports, cultural activities, and social service. Meritorious students securing top positions in university examinations are awarded for their academic performance. Prizes are also conferred upon winners of inter-college

**Class Tests:** As per the guidelines issued by the Himachal Pradesh University, the class tests of 5 marks each for every subject are conducted after completion of 40% of the syllabus. These class tests are likely to be conducted in the month of October every year.

**House Tests:** As per the guidelines issued by the Himachal Pradesh University, the House Tests of 10 marks each for every subject are conducted after completion of 70% of the syllabus. These House Tests are likely to be conducted in the month of December every year.

**End Term Examinations:** As per the instructions and schedule issued by the Himachal Pradesh University, the End Term Examinations (theory) of 70 marks each (for non- practical papers) and 50 marks each (for practical papers) are conducted every year. These examinations are likely to be conducted in the month of April every year.

**Practical Examinations:** As per the schedule issued by the Himachal Pradesh university, the practical examinations for B.A./B.Sc./B.Com. are conducted every year just before the End Term Examinations. These practical examinations are likely to be conducted in the month of March every year.

## LIBRARY-CUM-IDENTITY CARD (I-CARD) AND PROCEDURE TO PREPARE I-CARD

**Library-cum-Identity Card (I-Card):** A Library-cum-Identity Card serves the dual purposes i.e.; proof of identity and library access. It will be issued to the students just after the conclusion of the admission process and confirmation of the admission of the candidate after depositing the admission fee through online admission mode.

### Procedure to Prepare Library-cum-Identity Card:

- Just after the confirmation of admission from the administrative office, the student will visit the college library to collect their Library-cum-Identity Card.
- Fill the required details: Name of the student, Course and Year, Roll Number, Contact Details, Signature, pasting his/her Passport Size Photograph on the space provide in the I-Card.
- Visit the concerned subject teacher (DSC-I) and will get his details verified by producing the copy of fee receipt.
- The concerned subject teacher (DSC-I) will put his/her signature in place of tutor.
- Now, the student will visit the library and get this I-Card signed from the Assistant Librarian.



- Thereafter, the student will get this I-Card signed from the Principal and duly stamped it from the administrative office.
- The student will carry this duly signed I-Card daily to the college and will produce on demand.
- This I-Card will be valid up to one academic year only.
- In case of loss of I-Card, it must be reported to college administration in writing. A duplicate card will be issued after depositing the required fee.
- This I-Card will be used as a proof of identity as a college candidate only and to issue books from the library.

## GENERAL CONDUCT AND DISCIPLINE RULES, LEAVE RULES FOR STUDENTS

### 1. Attendance Requirements:

- A minimum of **75% attendance** is mandatory to appear in End-Term-Examinations.
- Continuous absence for **7 days or more** may result in the student's name being struck off the college roll. Re-admission will be allowed only after citing the valid reason with documentary proof of undue absence which may further require approval from the concerned subject incharge and college authorities.

### 2. Identity Card (I-Card):

- Students must carry their **college-issued Library-cum-Identity Card** at all times on campus and present it upon request.
- In case of loss, a duplicate card is issued only after lodging an FIR and paying a nominal fee.

### 3. Prohibited Activities:

- **Ragging** in any form is strictly prohibited and is a punishable offence under the Himachal Pradesh Educational Institutions (Prohibition of Ragging) Act, 2009.
- **Smoking, consumption of alcohol, and uses of drugs** are banned within the college premises.
- **Mobile phone usage** is restricted; using phones in classrooms or unauthorised areas may lead to penalties.
- **Vandalism**, including graffiti or damage to college property, is considered a serious offense.

### 4. Behavioural Expectations:

- Students should maintain **discipline and decorum** within the campus. Loitering in corridors, during class hours is discouraged.
- **Organising meeting or events** requires prior permission from the college authorities.
- **Use of abusive language, harassment, or any form of misconduct** can lead to disciplinary action, including suspension or expulsion.

## Leave Rules for Students:

### Leave Rules for Students:

- Students must submit leave applications in the prescribed format. Short leaves up to 5 days can be sanctioned by the tutors, while longer leaves require approval from senior tutors or the principal.
- Unauthorised absence without prior permission and intimation will lead to struck off the name of the student from the college roll.
